


Deadly danger lurking on scenic roads

NFU Mutual Rural Road Safety Report 2023



Foreword

Rural roads are not only the arteries of the rural economy, but also the gateway to our countryside and a source of enjoyment for millions.

We launched NFU Mutual's rural road safety campaign in 2021 as a reaction to the statistics showing the disproportionate number of lives lost on countryside roads each year. As the leading rural insurer with customers and Agents in rural communities across the country, we are concerned – and we know our customers are concerned – about the loss of life on these roads.

We've analysed the latest statistics from the Department for Transport to highlight the disparity

in safety between urban and rural roads and the higher risk shouldered by vulnerable road users.

Sadly, our analysis shows that, after a few years of decreasing fatalities, rural roads are becoming more deadly again. Over 1,000 people lost their lives on rural roads last year, with thousands more injured.

Every road death is one too many, and we believe serious conversations need to happen to make rural roads safer for everyone.

That is why we are today announcing a Code for Countryside Roads, which will take in feedback and advice from experts and groups to provide a clear guide to how people should use rural roads.

We all need to work together to ensure we keep our countryside as safe as it can be.

We invite members of the public and experts to get in touch with us to feed into the Code for Countryside Roads and hope the document, once published, will help steer a course towards safer rural roads for all road users.






Rural road deaths up 14%


Rural road deaths have rocketed 14% to a four-year high in 2022, with 1017 people losing their lives on these highways. This figure is 72% more than the 593 deaths on urban roads last year, highlighting the disproportionate danger on rural roads.



Rural roads significantly more deadly than urban highways

Tragically, accidents on rural roads are around four times more likely to result in a fatality. In 2022, an average of one in every 31 accidents (1017 of 31395) on rural highways resulted in a death, compared to one in every 120 (593 of 71151) on urban roads. ii







Vulnerable road users at highest risk

In 2022, motorists and their passengers were more than three times more likely to lose their lives on a rural road than an urban highway. The death of car drivers and their passengers increased 23% to 557, returning to levels not seen since 2018. Urban fatalities for people in cars totalled 176 in 2022.

Despite this, vulnerable road users are at significantly more risk than car drivers and their passengers, by average miles travelled per person.ⁱⁱⁱ


More than twice as many motorcyclists lost their lives on rural roads (240) than urban roads (103) in 2022. With an average of just 64 miles per year per person completed by motorcycles on rural roads, motorcyclists remained the most at risk vulnerable road user group as deaths increased 11% from 2021.

Pedestrian deaths on rural roads also increased as around one rural walker or rambler tragically died every three days in 2022 – an increase of 11% from the year before.

After a spike during lockdown, cycling deaths decreased for the second year in a row, to 46, just one more than the number killed in urban areas.^{iv}

Horses and their riders are another vulnerable road user group significantly at risk on rural roads. According to The British Horse Society, 69 horses were killed on the road in 2022 and 139 riders injured, with equine-related road incidents increasing 21% on 2021.





Road deaths by region

The East of England saw the highest number of rural road fatalities (154) in 2022, followed by the South East (146), the East Midlands (131), Scotland (127) and the South West (113).

Only the North East and North West, each of which encompass large metropolitan areas, saw more urban road deaths than rural road fatalities.

Survey Results: More than 1 in 7 people have been in an accident on a rural road

In November 2023, Yonder conducted a survey of 2,065 people across the UK on behalf of NFU Mutual. $^{\rm vi}$


The survey found that 15% of people have been in an accident on a rural road, with 13% of the urban population experiencing an accident on a rural road. Over one fifth of respondents (22%) were uncomfortable driving on rural roads, rising to over a third (36%) for those without a car.

The survey also showed that people were unaware of the disproportionate danger of rural roads but that many were concerned about rural road safety. Among respondents' top concerns about rural road safety were blind corners (63%), narrow roads (53%), impatient drivers (50%) and people breaking the speed limit (47%). Over a third (38% were worried about navigating vulnerable road users and a quarter were concerned about dealing with agricultural traffic.

15% of people said they had been involved in an accident on a rural road, either as a driver, passenger, or other road user.

But as a group, survey respondents did not correctly identify the outsize danger of rural roads.


Which of the following road types do you think sees the most road accident deaths?





22% of survey respondents are uncomfortable traveling on rural roads, with many concerns about rural road safety.

What are your biggest concerns when it comes to rural road safety?



62% of respondents want to see road quality improve and 47% want to see reduced speed limits to improve rural road safety.

Sat-navs directing people down inappropriate roads and guidance and training for rural road users were also important to significant numbers of respondents.

In your opinion, what can/should be done to improve rural road safety?
